

**Aerospace Engineering and Engineering Mechanics**  
**APPROVED GENERAL EDUCATION ELECTIVES**  
**(for use with the 2016-17 ISU Bulletin of Courses and Programs)**

All Aerospace Engineering majors must take 12 credits of General Education (GEN ED) courses. Students are encouraged to select GEN ED courses that broaden their academic program. Courses in the social sciences (sociology, anthropology, journalism and mass communication, economics, political science, human development and family studies, psychology) or humanities (architecture, literature, foreign language, philosophy, religion, history) are especially encouraged. Courses used to satisfy the GEN ED requirement must satisfy the following rules:

1. The course may not be remedial – courses must be at the 100+ level.
2. You may not use an orientation course from another department (for example BUSAD 103).
3. You may not use more than 6 credits from a single department toward the GEN ED requirement.
4. No “skills” courses may be used (for example: sport classes such as bowling, golf, swimming, and tennis are not allowed; music courses focused on playing an instrument or participating in band or choir are not allowed; art classes focused on the mechanics of drawing or painting or taking pictures are not allowed; language or speech classes focused on the mechanics of writing or speaking are not allowed; etc.).
5. Courses must be taken for a letter grade – P/NP credits are not allowed.

The University also requires that students take at least one class (3 credits) in the area of U.S. Diversity and at least one class (3 credits) in the area of International Perspectives. In most cases, courses used to meet the U.S. Diversity and International Perspectives requirements can also be used to fulfill GEN ED requirements. However, if the chosen U.S. Diversity or International Perspective course is not on the following GEN ED list, then additional GEN ED credits must be taken to meet the minimum 12 GEN ED credits.

Additional Notes:

- Only undergraduate courses are listed in this document. Graduate level courses will be considered on a case-by-case basis
- <sup>US</sup> Indicates that credit goes toward meeting the U.S. Diversity Requirement. A minimum of 3 credit hours are needed to meet this requirement.
- <sup>IP</sup> Indicates that credit goes toward meeting the International Perspectives Requirement. A minimum of 3 credit hours are needed to meet this requirement.
- \* Indicates that a course is a recommended prerequisite but not a mandatory prerequisite.

While every effort has been taken to ensure the accuracy of this document, the catalog is the final authority on the number of credits, the prerequisites, and whether the course satisfies either the U.S. Diversity or International Perspectives Requirements.
